Once you have identified a project, you will be able to register it on the website, and we will provide links to ensure that we receive media coverage. Last year, 50,000 Rotarians participated in this event, representing thousands of clubs.





Billericay Mayflower's Christmas Market 2023—Nearly £39,000 raised for charitable causes!

With Billericay Christmas Market (BMC) 2022 having been declared the "best ever", the expectation for BCM2023 was going to prove a challenge, and so it was.

Multiple changes in the High Street, with more closed shops and with some 40 of 2022's stallholders ceasing to trade either due to retirement or economic pressures meant that layout planning was more difficult. Survival of the High Street is a concern in itself, with businesses struggling with increased rents and loss of trade due to bank closures and offices being replaced by residential use. All of this led to a bit of a downbeat atmosphere, but everyone was looking forward to BCM to offer some relief from the gloom and doom.

And then there was the weather! Or more precisely the weather forecast, which proved as unreliable as ever, but probably had a negative influence on attendance. The weather itself put paid to being able to use Sun Corner for car parking, and the failure of NCP to even reply to this year's request for free parking at the railway station compounded our concerns on the day.

So, it was with a little more concern than I can remember that I entered the High Street at 6am on Sunday, Dec 3. By 7am, the parked cars had cleared the High Street, the road was closed, and stalls started to arrive. The entry marshals and zone managers did a brilliant job at set-up coping with all the changes and new stalls not familiar with our processes. Billericay Round Table turned out in force along with Billericay Town RC's Nick Lang to assist Library set up, and we were ready for visitors by 10am as planned. Jan Howe ensured that refreshments were available for our army of yellow bibs, and even the weather started to co-operate.

Santa's Parade commenced just after 11am, with the crowds as big as I can remember. Santa was delivered safely to his grotto, courtesy of our good friends from Brentwood RC. BCM 2023 was underway as planned.

My observation was that all the shops, cafes, and restaurants were full to bursting, all day, despite alternatives provided by the stalls, and that crowds persisted until the last hour when it rained heavily.

Santa and the face painter were overwhelmed with demand from our young visitors!

The Basildon County Council road sweepers did their usual excellent job and the road re-opening went well as we opened ahead of time.

He had a dogged determination and stubborn streak that made him an ideal "tax collector" from High Street businesses prior to Christmas Market for example. Derek was gregarious and always attended club meetings when he was in the country. He loved scattering to other clubs and was part of a scatter group that went at various times to Ireland, Scotland, the Isle of Man, France, and Belgium. He had an easy manner with people and made friends wherever he went.

In recognition of his achievements, the club awarded him a very much deserved PHF in 2011. Derek was a Rotarian of the highest calibre. He was a popular, well-loved and well-respected member of Billericay Mayflower who will be much missed by us all. Alistair Moulds

What a long time it seems since Christmas! In reality, it's only a couple of months – or less at the time of writing – but we've still managed to enjoy a number of memorable events.

Our first event in 2024 was a fellowship meeting, when we discussed the recent Christmas collections while they were still fresh in our minds, to see if we were happy with how they went, with the result, and to evaluate what we should be doing next Christmas. Pre-Covid,

we were able to man several collection sites in the town centre and at local supermarkets for a full two weeks before Christmas. Post-Covid this has proved a challenge. It is not only that we currently have fewer able-bodied members than pre-Covid, nor that the younger members find it hard to take time out of their busy work schedule, but, more worryingly, that the supermarkets haven't been able to offer us as many collecting days. But most of our members managed to take a few slots and, with the help of partners, Friends of Rotary and 'special ladies', as we call Club Members' widows, we still managed to collect in excess of £6000.

Our second speaker in January was Jake Tucker – CEO of Bishop's Stortford Youth Project and, in particular, the Thirst Youth Café. Thirst Youth Café is a safe space, run by Bishop's Stortford Youth Project, for young people from 11 to 18 to come, eat, relax, play and enjoy each other's company whilst also being a place where they can be creative, receive support and advice from experienced youth workers and positive role models. It is also a place where no parents or grown ups are allowed, except for the project's staff.

We were delighted to have again sponsored the Young Carer Award in the Indies Awards, organised brilliantly by the local newspaper, Bishop's Stortford Independent, held on Friday 26th January at BS Rugby Club. The award went to 15 year old James Windridge, a student at Hockerill Anglo European College, who was recognised for the care he gives to his brother, Toby, who is 2 years younger and suffers from



Angelman Syndrome, a rare genetic condition that affects the nervous system and causes severe physical and learning disabilities. Toby attends Amwell View School. James says he is trying to take on the lifting and carrying of his brother, which gets more difficult as Toby gets older and heavier, to make things easier for his parents. He tries to make sure he has a relatively normal childhood, with access to modern stuff. He had been nominated by the boys' mother Helen, who said James doesn't only help Toby with physical things, but



provides friendship and fun for his little brother, who shares with James a love of Marvel films. We are proud to have enabled James

Through Gary and Penny we have been able to contribute to different projects which include new guttering and a water collection system to provide safe water and a perimeter fence to protect the school and the children in their remote environment.

At the end of January Penny and Gary were our guests at a club meeting where they presented on their progress and it was heartening to see how donations were being spent.

He joined the Rotary Club of Brentwood in 1990 and took on his role as a staunch Rotarian. He chaired many committees and was President from 2005 to 2006 but will always be known as "The Best Father Christmas". Christmas activities will not be the same without him.

Peter was involved in many things locally, a member of the Chamber of Commerce, School Governor and a local Councillor in 2002 for Shenfield.

In the last few years, Peter took up Bowls and like most things he was very good at it. He entered into club life, running the bar and he and Ceyla took on the flower bed maintenance.

Peter's last 18 months were tough. He developed skin cancer in 2022 and following his surgery, Ceyla also became seriously ill and died in April last year. Peter despite his loss, was determined to carry on life doing the things he loved; being with his family, walking the dogs with the friends he had close to his home and getting back to Bowls and the Rotary Club but sadly that time was all too short. The last few months Peter has struggled with his illness and that is now over. He will always be remembered for his kindness, his sense of fun, generosity of spirit and love of life. Brightlingsea & District Sleigh Runs Break Fundraising Record

The Rotary Club of Brightlingsea & District's annual Santa Sleigh runs, which have been going for over 40 years, continue to go from strength to strength. Santa and the sleigh were out visiting the streets of Brightlingsea and the surrounding villages every night from 1 to 24 December 2023, and also made several special

appearances at community events and to local care homes and schools. This year, for the first time, the sleigh team carried credit card machines which helped raise additional funds, and live tracking was used so that people could follow his progress and come out as he was approaching theirarea, rather than having to wait out in the cold to avoid missing him.

The club partners with local charities and community organisations, who provide the door to door collecting teams for the runs and then share the night's profits 50/50. In addition Brightlingsea's Satellite Club in St Osyth use the sleigh for runs around St Osyth and Point Clear. Alongside the club's own members, the sleigh is Santa waving to everyone on supported by a number of friends of Rotary who help with towing, Santa duties, maintaining, servicing and storing the sleigh, etc, and huge thanks must go to all the volunteers who make this much loved community tradition possible.

But the biggest thanks of all goes to the communities of Brightlingsea, Wivenhoe, St Osyth, Gt Bentley, Elmstead Market, Thorrington and Alresford, who come out to see Santa and who donate so generously. Despite the current economic climate, the club is delighted to announce that the record breaking sum of £6,896.24 was raised, £2,830 of which was distributed to the collecting partners, and the balance of which will be used by the Rotary Club to support local projects, charities and good causes.

Support & Benevolence Sub-group

The Club recently formed a sub-group 'Support & Benevolence' (S&B) of the Clubs Community and Vocational Committee. The group are made up of club members Rob Oakley, Sue Hampson, Tracy Winch, Tony Clarke and Rev. Maron Walford.

S&B takes a very pro— active approach to helping those people in the Canvey Island community by building relationships linked in with contacts at the local churches, Canvey's schools and local community groups, etc.

One initiative the group has put into action has been to purchase 70 Throws and thermal sock packs in response to the current cold weather in order to donate to various individuals and organisations within the community.

Below are some of the recipients:

A number were also delivered to Canvey Methodist Church which is a designated 'Warm Hub'. Here the Throws are kept on site and available to those people using the facility.

The S&B group learnt that the Canvey library run an initiative whereby they offer a book delivery service to those people unable to leave their homes. To that end the group donated:

20 Throws and sock packs to the library staff who will in turn use their judgment in terms of distribution.

Various groups use the facilities at the Canvey Island War Memorial Hall and here S&B have donated 14 Throws and sock packs.

The group has also given circa 10 Throws and sock sets to individual members of the community—a contact of the group forwarded a number of responses on behalf of some of the recipients, two of which are:

One lady whose husband had very recently passed away, cried and said thank you so much. She had been looking at Throws and said she could not afford one. Our contact said her home felt quite cold as she only puts her heating on for a short time and ended by saying she didn't realise how emotionally straining it could be giving the Throws etc. to genuine people that really needed them.

'Can you pass on a big thank you to the Rotary Club from a 95-year-old for the Throw and socks. She was not offended at all and was very humble and grateful that she was thought of at Christmas time.

s&B visited three local homeless men and gave them a number of thermal sock packs. They were extremely grateful - we have since discovered that one of the men is ex-military.

Greeting from sunny Frinton on Sea!

Following on from our remarkable festive efforts with Santa and his sleigh, I am pleased to report that we have raised over £8,000, which will go to our community projects, from our street and static collections. These annual affairs, along with our Carol Service, really elevate our positive community profile to an even wider audience. I had personally expected a modest outcome from collection efforts, owing to the financial squeeze that many are experiencing of late, BUT we actually managed to break all previous records! As a club, we were staggered by the response, both financially and socially.



Youth

At the Rotary Club of Frinton-On-Sea, we recognise that our children are the future and, as a club, we stand side by side with them in supporting and guiding their journey of discovery and growth. 'Serve to Change Lives' sits right at the heart of our purpose. We are painfully aware that we continue to face challenging times for our youth in our district; worryingly, Tendring is sitting top of the 'in crisis' league table of areas across the county for probable mental health disorders in young people, with anxiety, depression, self-harm or worse.

As a club, under the astute guidance of our Youth Chair, Kevin Smith, we continue to forge ahead in helping to support our local young people. We have seen the youth club in Walton On The Naze grow beyond expectations; attendance has rocketed from barely a dozen up to nigh on 200 per week. In what was once a near empty room, we now accommodate 4 sessions a week, splitting age groups, visiting fitness classes and arranging outbound adventures to Wales, Christmas discos and weekend 'hangout' activities. We have helped in providing a safe place to socialise, enjoy board games, (chess and backgammon are particular favourites), pool, table tennis, musical facilities, badminton, table

football, group games and more! This upward momentum is being lauded across our community for the positive impact it is demonstrably having, even beyond the club. These efforts were recognised nationally and received a Coronation Champions award and Community awards for Tendring last September.

We are on a mission to give our young people hope, belief and purpose and it is having a very real positive impact on the community. In supporting a local youth club with funding, leadership and manpower and the children really enjoy the stability, engagement and opportunities that are being afforded to them. In addition, next Easter, 40 of the children will once again head out to the Brecon Beacons for a 5-day residential experience that they will surely remember for the rest of their lives!

We rolled out an after-school club enrichment programme across our local primary schools, that will see 600 primary school children develop their emotional vocabulary, self-esteem, confidence and resilience. Local Headteachers are most pleased with the impact the after-school club provision is having. Several children stepped up to the task of delivering all-school assemblies to share their learning around feelings, emotions, empathy, resilience and the importance of self-care. Our local press has profiled the impact and this initiative will continue to make headlines in the months ahead.



Commu- nity

At the other end of the age spectrum, we have been working closely with our local Women's Institute, helping to facilitate, transport and host twice monthly tea afternoons (with cake....) for our more mature residents. Numbers are visibly increasing as this facility gains greater traction and awareness and we expect greater attendance as Spring approaches. These social activities sit alongside our wonderful tea afternoons at Frinton Golf Club and are now twice yearly events. Local entertainers perform and there will be tea and stickies in abundance – plus the bar is open.....

Over the festive period, we arranged for contact calls and cards, so that they won't feel so alone at that often difficult time. We shall do the same for Easter, with maybe an egg or bunny shaped treat; we work with a local school in this enterprise and this benefits both the elderly and the kids!

For the past 20 plus years, Rotarian PP Michael Chaplin has organised a theatre treats for local elderly folk and the 2023 event was bigger and better than ever. For many, a trip to the theatre provides an opportunity to escape life's daily routine. A live performance can touch the hearts and minds of an audience and we hosted more than 150 elderly residents who enjoyed an afternoon treat at Frinton Summer Theatre, 'The Lady-killers' was the play – fabulous production!!

On a more sobering note, we are sad to witness the alarming increase of male mental health appeals from our community. Christmas and New Year can be a tough time for some folk. We are now working closely with Tendring Wellbeing and Intervention Services based in Thorpe-le-Soken. It's fair to say that for many men, talking about feelings and mental health can feel like a sign of weakness. The truth is, speaking about how you're feeling can be one of the bravest and most powerful things you can do. Finding the right environment, the right pair of ears, the right time or even the right words to say, can all be barriers, which can lead to staying silent. That's why we're on a mission to encourage men to break the silence and start talking. Men's Walk and Talk meeting are now being conducted every Monday the aim of which is to help by listening, sharing and empathising as much as possible, assuring that they need not be alone. There is a helpline facility in place too – sadly, the number of calls now being made and managed is reaching very worrying numbers. We are honoured to be able to support this very necessary service but hearing some of the stories really do make one stop and think how tough can be for far too many people. This will be a priority for this year for Frinton Rotary Club

That fateful meeting is considered to be the first meeting of the organisation that has grown to be the worldwide organisation of Rotary International.


