BISHOPS STORTFORD

It's been a quiet September, but we did send funds to Shelterbox for the Morocco earthquake and also had an interesting speaker on 18th September on Ukraine.

David Royle is co-founder of Homes For Ukraine – Sawbridgeworth – Support Group, and also a former member – and Past President – of our Club. It was good to have him back with us, this time as a welcome guest.

David updated us on the Group's progress and recent work, and said that the town's Ukrainian guests have settled into a routine. Some now have their own flats, and are either working or hoping to do so soon. Some returned to Ukraine, but a number of these now want to return to the UK because of the stress of life there.

David gave us some statistics, saying that the US has estimated that some 500,000 in all from both sides have now been killed in Ukraine. 3,750 schools have been damaged or destroyed. 400,000 children are currently studying online abroad and less than half are studying full-time. There are currently 914 Ukrainian guests in Hertfordshire, and 488 host households, hosting 259 children and 641 adult guests. We were grateful for David's update on his Group and its work.

On 6th October, a party of seventeen members and wives set off for the Joint District Conference at Stratford upon Avon. We all met for lunch at The Castle at Edgehill, to give a good start to the weekend. We took advantage of the Friday evening to have dinner at the RSC Theatre Restaurant, followed by watching Macbeth. Altogether a splendid day.

We all enjoyed the whole weekend and thought the range and quality of speakers was very good. I was running the Rotary Jaipur Limb stand in the Showcase and was pleased to have new interest from the delegates from District 1260, plus some old friends from District 1240.

Following the close of an excellent Conference on the Sunday, we finished off with Sunday roast back at The Castle at Edgehill.

On 24th September, Rotary Club of Chelmsford Phoenix organised an event for Walk A Mile to End Polio. Members of Phoenix and Chelmsford Rotary Clubs together with friends and two dogs met at Central Park in Chelmsford. We walked through Central Park, into Admirals Park and around Tower Gardens, returning via the Central Park Cafe where we enjoyed coffee, snacks and chat.

It was a fine day and the walk was enjoyed by all. Some members who were unable to attend on the day also made donations. In total we raised £271 for End Polio.



We have had a couple of good speakers recently. Aron Lane from Little Havens came to tell us about the excellent work they do. We donated £500 to them with some of the proceeds from our Choir Competition in 2023. We also met Phil Evans, a retired army officer, who told us about his life in the army and the challenges he faced, together with some amusing stories. We also welcomed our District Governor, David Willis, who told us about his aspirations for the year.

CLACTON-ON-SEA & CLACTON JUBILEE

Clacton Air Show 2023

This year, Clacton & Jubilee Rotary Clubs combined their resources to operate the official carpark for the Clacton Airshow, on Thursday. 24th and Friday 25th August. The site was a little smaller than previous years as it was shared with the travelling circus, but they were very helpful by adjusting their performances to our benefit.

Despite the poor weather forecast for the Thursday, the rain held off and the carpark was full on both days. Clearly our planning paid off as the public were very complimentary about the arrangements. The Red Arrows closed the afternoon session with an excellent performance and many of the aircraft enthusiasts said that it was probably the best performance they had seen. Many of the crowd stayed on for the evening performance and were not disappointed with the spectacle.

The weather forecast for the Friday was much better and the crowds flocked into Clacton early, with the carpark full on both days just after midday. The "Reds" opened the day's display with another spectacular performance which was then followed by a variety of aircraft providing more stunning performances.

Over the two days, 1,630 cars were parked at £10 per each. After expenses £15,310 profit was made,all of which will go to charitable organisations.

The Rotary Clubs are extremely grateful to Penny Smith for allowing her fields to again be used for this event.



COLCHESTER CAMULOS

Bikes for Ukrainian Evacuees

We were delighted to receive a further Rotary International Disaster Recovery Grant of £2,000 which is allowing us to purchase bikes for Ukrainian evacuee families based in the Colchester area. Last year we supplied about 50 bikes (again using Rotary International Disaster Recovery grants). When we asked the self-help group (Volya Ukraina) what they needed, the overwhelming response was "more bikes please". We purchase the bikes from Facebook market place, carefully checking that they are safe and in good condition, we also supply a helmet and high viz vest- all

packed in a sport bag supplied by Ellisons Solicitors. The first batch of 20 bikes were handed over to the group on 23rd July. It was so good to see the smiling faces of the happy recipients. The bikes mean so much to them. Apart from providing essential transport it is also a brilliant way of families being able to spend time with each other. We are now searching for the next 20 bikes!



Yarra Farm re-wilding project

Phase 1 of our project is now complete. We have planted around 250 hedgerow saplings around the border of our 2/3 acre project field and created 4 wonderful insect hotels. All this has been done in conjunction with the four special needs schools who are part of the project. We are now raring to go with Phase 2 which will include a wheelchair friendly pathway and a covered shelter for the children to use when they visit the re-wilding project. We are also in the process of restoring two bee-hives to keep the emerging wildflowers well pollinated – and of course to produce some wild honey. The project involves our colleagues from the Rotary Clubs of Colchester, Colchester Forum and we are very pleased that Rotary Club of Halstead have also joined the team. This has become an environmental project which also benefits the pupils of local special needs schools who love coming to the area and having some hands on experience.

Ukraine National Day

It was an absolute pleasure to be able to host a Ukrainian National Day BBQ at Yarra Farm. The self-help group Volya Ukraina asked if we knew anywhere they could hold a BBQ. We spoke to Sue Middleton, the owner at Yarra Farm, and she happily agreed to open up especially for the group. Staff at Yarra were also on hand to show the 30 odd adults plus children around the farm to see all the animals and feed

them. It was wonderful to see so many happy faces and the occasional tears of joy for the opportunity to have a wonderful respite day and forget the horrendous situation the members of the group have in their home country. This was Rotary at its best — using our connections and acting as a catalyst to help people. Volya Ukraina presented us with an unexpected Certificate of Appreciation for the help we have provided them.

Here is his letter

"It is a good morning here in Bunyonyi Uganda.

We want to extend our sincere appreciation to Polio and Children in Need Charity and Rotary Club of Romford that made the purchase of an Orphanage Ambulance possible.

Before the ambulance we used to suffer with transport challenges mostly with emergencies like transporting a sick child who has been transferred to a referral or improved healthy centre in Kabale town but now ever since we received an ambulance, it is always on standby.

We have been able to attend all emergencies that happen even after midnight at the orphanage. We have a very smooth transport of our children to town to hospitals and other nearby places e.g. when our children are going for competitions e.g. mathematics contest, debating, TVs and radio shows to debate.

The ambulance has really done great for us and saved us in terms of transport fares which was very costly for us.

Our staff also go for refresher courses and this ambulance has helped us to transport our staff to those places.

The ambulance still has its original heart, it is in very good condition and is taken good care of. It has helped us to transport 21 emergencies after midnight in two years. It has also helped us to transport 47 emergencies during day time and evening. It has done great for us. This is so helpful. We no longer suffer with transport.

A visit to our Club by the notable "Doug Gee".

An hilarious evening was guaranteed when Mister Gees- Douglas Green agreed to tell us about his 50 years in "the village" since opening his first newsagent shop in 1972 on Warwick Parade.

He told us that he had always been just a shopkeeper but his jovial and quick wit is evidence of decades of experience in various ventures, including a five year stint running a winery in rural Victoria, Australia, (witnessing the disastrous effects of chronic water shortage) and the purchase in France of a property for renovation which, to this day, he describes as camping under cover.

As with our Club members, Doug wanted to give something back to the SWF Community. Rather than retire (again) he started Mister Gees Foundation, the income for which comes through the Charity Shop in Warwick Parade, staffed by almost fifty volunteers. With no paid directors or employees not less than fifty per cent of the profit is used for good causes in South Woodham (over £160,000 to date) and the balance is focussed on assisting post graduate students, young and old, to read for a Master's Degree in UK Universities, in sustainable food production and water management, so important to us all.

Our Club hopes that there will be opportunities to work together with the Foundation for the benefit of our SWF Community.

Club Meeting.

At a recent meeting we were pleased to be joined by Freddie, Head Boy of William de Ferrers School and by Joni Thompson, Clinical and Business Development Director for the Open Road organisation.

Rotary. Vice Chairman of our Youth Committee, Rtn Roger Gatford, spoke about what we do; how we work differently from other organisations and the evolution of Rotary over more than 110 years into a global network. He focussed on two of the building blocks towards Rotary. "RotaKids" — we have clubs in Elmwood School and in Trinity St Mary's and hope to start a third soon, catering for children in years 2-6. "Interact" for 11-18yr olds. We have the agreement of the Head of William de Ferrers, Mike Applewhite and support of Annette Redfearn, Student Support Worker for Year 7, to help form a club. The school has been praised for providing several extracurricular activities and Interact offers an introduction for young people to discover the benefits of organising and running a club (with the support of Rotary), and creating genuine opportunities to generate social change. It is also an Approved Activity Provider for the Duke of Edinburgh's award.

Open Road.

Joni Thompson, pictured receiving a contribution towards their work from our President Kush Dave, spoke about Open Road, a no -profit, leading drug and alcohol support service based in Essex and Medway Kent. It was founded 32 years ago and has developed into an organisation with 120 employees, 37% of whom are recovered addicts, and 280 volunteers who reflect the different challenges faced. A motto "from harm to hope" underlines the successful completions they have achieved notwithstanding the changes in the level of drug availability, and the market profile in-



cluding prescribed medications and alchohol. Working with NHS, Public Health, national and local voluntary and corporate organisations and corporations and running an SOS Bus for the night time Economy they provide a magnificent service to the community applauded by our Club.

The Friends of the Hertfordshire Way provided guides for each section and also helped to organise the event, for which we are very grateful.

The routes covered the towns and villages of Royston, Wallington, Little Wymondley, Codicote, St Albans, Markyate, Tring, Kings Langley, Shenley, Cuffley, Hertford, Widford, Bishops Stortford and Hare Street.



Gordon Morrison, Co-founder of Helping Herts, said: "It was wonderful to see the sense of joy and community that was evident on the day, as the walkers all enjoyed a great occasion, thanks to the efforts of so many people. The total of £66,000 will go a long way to ensuring our charities can continue to do vital work in their local communities. There is still time to donate - all donations are being doubled by two major donors, so you can make a really big difference!"


