BILLERICAY MAYFLOWER

People Of Action - Aid for Ukrainians

Rotary Club of Billericay Mayflower's Barry Howe has made a number of visits to Moldova, a small country bordering Ukraine, to deliver aid in this country and to fund and help build washroom and toilet facilities in schools where no such facilities existed.

The Rotary Club of Billericay has helped support these projects and reported on them in previous Newsletters. We were particularly moved by the reports made by Barry on his return from his last trip to Moldova where he saw at first hand two locations where Ukrainian refugees are housed, and how desperate is the deprivation in which they find themselves.

Disaster Fund Application

Barry Howe and Peter Greene of the two Rotary Clubs of Billericay, and Billericay Mayflower, got together earlier this year to see what could be done to help, and applied to the Rotary Foundation Disaster Response Fund for a grant which, together with donations by their two clubs, would fund a lorry of aid to Ukrainians in Moldova.





The issue was identified by the local community to Rotarian Barry Howe when he was last there in August 2022, and details were itemised in a WhatsApp post on April 28, 2023, in which this community appealed for food, toiletries, clothes and school supplies. (There are widespread shortages of

basic foods and supplies.) The Grant request was made on June 12, and after review by the District Grant's Committee was approved at end July.

Act Fast! - Time was of the essence as the next scheduled Aid Convoy to Moldova was scheduled for just ten days later so timing was very tight, but both clubs "broke records" transferring the money to source all the goods and to pay for them within a day of receiving the grant, on August 4.

Barry pulled out all the stops, and collected the aid which was so desperately needed, and had it loaded onto the trucks and vans heading to Moldova. The bulk of the aid comprised food, clothing, children's pens, pencils, books, bicycles and toiletries.

BILLERICAY MAYFLOWER (CONT'D)

People Of Action - Aid for Ukrainians

The Aid convoy vehicles, one 18-ton lorry and one 40 foot Artic, plus two tall long wheel base vans, assembled at Albea in Colchester (cosmetic tube manufacturer who allow the lorries to be securely parked there). All the aid was loaded onto the vehicles there, and the vehicles set off on schedule on August 10 for their overland journey to Moldova, where they arrived on August 13.

Barry and wife Janet, (Janet is a member of the third Rotary Club in Billericay – the Rotary Club of Billericay Town) left at the same time in a separate motorhome and were waiting for the aid convoy when it arrived in Moldova. They were on-site to ensure that the aid was safely distributed to the Ukrainian

refugees who needed it most, in the camps which Barry had visited on his previous trip last year.



Why Moldova?

It's a little known fact that ...

The Rotary Clubs of Billericay and of Billericay Mayflower were shocked by the plight of Ukrainian refugees in Moldova and further investigation established that Moldova has received 718,657 Ukrainian refugees and 84,077 third country nationals since late February 2022.

Of these, 107,480 have chosen to stay in the country as of 16 April 2023, and of these, 47,298 are under the age of 18 years old. (UNHCR)

It is hosting the highest number of Ukrainian refugees per head compared to other EU and EU-neighbouring countries including Poland! (UNDP December 2022)

Hedgehogs and the Environment.

I was recently invited to a meeting attended by a representative of Essex Wildlife Trust, to hear about the current plight of hedgehogs and that hedgehog numbers are decreasing rapidly all over the UK, threatening their extinction. There are a number of reasons for this decline including decreases in natural habitat, the uprooting of hedges in rural areas and the use of pesticides on arable land, fenced off and paved over gardens in urban areas. So, how can we help to stem this decline and encourage growth in numbers? The most important thing we can do, is to put a hedgehog hole in our gardens. This is simply a 13cm x 13cm hole in a fence or wall which can help to create a "hedgehog highway".

Further help is provided by putting out freshwater in a shallow dish; leaving out dog or cat food (they can be fed all year round and it will not affect their hibernation); avoid using pesticides and keep the garden chemically free (they are gardeners' friends because they eat beetles, caterpillars, worms and other invertebrates you might not want); check before using mowers, strimmers and lighting a bonfire; leave an untidy area of garden with long grass, weeds, wildflowers and leaf piles; keep an eye on dogs at night in the garden; cover open drains and provide escape ramps from ponds.

We can also encourage our children/grandchildren to keep a record of hedgehog sightings, information which should be gathered, and then passed on to Essex Wildlife Trust who are conducting a survey.

Hedgehogs are nocturnal animals and if you find one out in the day it is ill and needs help along with any that are visibly injured. Contact Hedgehog Haven Essex on 07709 767511 or South Essex Wildlife Hospital 01375 893893. For more information https://ptes.org/campaigns/hedgehogs/

More support for youth drama development

Clacton County High School has established an enviable reputation for drama and enthusing and developing the acting talent of its pupils to put on some truly impressive productions. The Rotary Club of Clacton-on-Sea has in the past recognised and supported the work done at the school to inspire pupils of all abilities to get involved, including those with disabilities, by helping to boost funds to pay for costumes and other materials. Sarah Cooper is a drama teacher at County High and is also a co-director, along with actor David Garlick, of the CO15 Theatre Group which is dedicated to staging and performing "provocative" works created by and for the community in and around Clacton.

The Theatre Group's inaugural project back in 2021 saw them workshop and write a play about the legendary Weeley Festival, which took place close to Clacton in 1971 and since has gone down in music folklore. This festival was the brain-child of two members of the local Round Table who thought they might get as many as 10,000 people to attend. It was a run-away success with more than ten times that number turning up to enjoy music from many of the biggest names in rock music at the time.

It was always Sarah and David's aim to develop this play into a full-on stage show and this year, 52 years on from the festival, their production called 'Get it on' opened at the Princes Theatre, Clacton. Sarah and David not only involved children from Clacton County High but others from five more schools around the district, more than 60 kids in all. A similar number of musicians, including a 24 piece orchestra and various bands, came together to recreate some of the sounds from the festival. The ages of all involved ranged from 11-71 years, underlining the huge local community support.

Sarah now wants to provide opportunities for the children to further explore how they can develop their acting talent and at the weekly lunch for club Rotarians on the 31st August, President Brian Henesy presented Sarah and David with a cheque for £1,000 - money they intend to use to help pay for a planned trip to London with the

Bikes for Ukrainian Evacuees

We were delighted to receive a further Rotary International Disaster Recovery Grant of £2,000 that is allowing us to purchase bikes for Ukrainian evacuee families based in the Colchester area. Last year we supplied about 50 bikes (again using Rotary International Disaster Recovery grants). When we asked the self-help group (Volya Ukraina) what they needed, the overwhelming response was "more bikes please".

We purchase the bikes from Facebook market place, carefully checking that they are safe and in good condition, we also supply a helmet and high viz vest- all packed in a sport bag supplied by Ellisons Solicitors. The first batch of 20 bikes were handed over to the group on 23rd July. It was so good to see the smiling faces of the happy recipients. The bikes mean so much to



them. Apart from providing essential transport it is also a brilliant way of families being able to spend time with each other. We are now searching for the next 20 bikes!

Yarra Farm re-wilding project

Phase 1 of our project is now complete. We have planted around 250 hedgerow saplings around the border of our 2/3 acre project field and created 4 wonderful insect hotels. All this has been done in conjunction with the four special needs schools who are part of the project. We are now raring to go with Phase 2 which will include a wheelchair friendly pathway and a covered shelter for the children to use when they visit the re-wilding project. We are also in the process of restoring two bee-hives to keep the emerging wildflowers well pollinated – and of course to produce some wild honey. The project involves our colleagues from the Rotary

Clubs of Colchester, Colchester Forum and we are very pleased that Rotary Club of Halstead have also joined the team. This has become an environmental project which also benefits the pupils of local special needs schools who love coming to the area and having some hands on experience.

Reading and maybe glancing at a recent picture gives an indication of the various interesting and enjoyable conversations, some rotary some not that take place at table.


If these few words prove to be of interest and an early start to the day appeals why not come along and join us—the sausages, the bacon is of the best.



District 1240 International – Rotary Action Group Against Slavery

Many of you will remember the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery. Our own Harry Payne was for many years secretary of this action group. He and Mark Little from District 1080 (Suffolk& Norfolk) were also involved in supporting Bakhita House which continues to provide a refuge for women escaping human trafficking and modern slavery. I understand from Harry that several of our clubs were involved in supporting this project at its creation.

Simon John from Thetford planned to cycle 1,400 kilometres from the Marian Shrines of Walsingham to Lourdes, France to help Anti-Slavery International's work to end slavery. His ride began on 26th June 2023 and Simon planned to arrive in Lourdes on 14th July 2023.



Sadly whilst cycling in France Simon was knocked off his cycle on 4th July 2023.

Recently Harry received this update on a fundraising effort supporting both the Bakhita House and Anti-Slavery International and he has asked me to share this with you and possibly support.

Initially Simon reported that his injuries were only minor, and he pressed on. Unfortunately, Simon developed a blood clot in his leg, which became a severe pulmonary embolism in the lungs and so regrettably, Simon has been unable to complete his planned trip. He had however completed 60% of the ride.

At the start of this ride, Simon said that he believed that everyone deserved to live a life free of exploitation. He felt that it wasn't easy to stop exploitation and secure freedom for a person during modern slavery, but Anti-Slavery International do just that.

Both Caritas Bakhita House and Rotary International Anti-Slavery are fighting modern slavery.
