Five Rotarians and four wives attended the 2023 conference at the Stifford Hall hotel on Saturday the 15th April. It was a very inspirational conference focusing on the need to change if Rotary is to survive.

## **BACK TO THE GAMBIA**

"Going back and seeing the the school and the children was a moving experience for us all" said Mick Fry. Mick had returned to Gambia with Terry Tilbrook, David Shea and former club member Geof Clark to visit the Grace Baptist School in Bafu, Gambia. The school had been built with funds raised by the efforts of a group of club members over a period of five years. Led by Terry, the group had kept a careful watch on the progress of the build through regular visits to Gambia. This was a final visit after several years to see how the school was working.

The group visited children in three classes and met their teachers. "When the children were told what our club had done for them, we got a tremendous response of their appreciation", said Terry. "They clapped us all and were full of joy at having a proper school to go to", added Mick. The group were impressed by the school's young teachers, some of whom they found to be very interesting.

The visit was also an opportunity to see five children whose education was being sponsored by David, Terry, and Geof. These are disadvantaged youngsters whose parents or carers could not otherwise afford to send them school. It was heartwarming to find that they were ambitious to do well and achieve qualifications leading to successful careers after school. The relative who was caring for twins sponsored by Terry told him that without his support he could not have paid the school fees himself, so without Terry's help they would have had no education at all.

There is no doubt that the Gambia School Project was a major achievement. South Woodham Ferrers Rotary Club can be proud of its members whose hard work and dedication is making a significant difference to the lives of children today and for years to come.

#### CLUB BACKING FOR FOOD BANK

Our Community Services Chairman writes:

Rotary continues to help the SWF Food Bank which is open on Wednesday mornings at the New Life Church in Clements Green Road. Club members have helped out with the distribution of collections for the Food Bank organised by Rotarian Lisa Kelly through the Asda store.

Gary Crocker, a retired policeman and volunteer at the Food Bank, recently told the Club about the throughput required to meet the increasing needs of those who find themselves in difficulty for many different reasons. Our Community Services Committee subsequently received approval for the purchase of supplies to a value of £500.

The view was taken that by spreading our purchasing every few weeks and in consultation with helpers at the Food Bank, we would better be able to focus on the items in demand at that particular time. This would also use the Club's donation to the best effect in support of people in our town. The first tranche was delivered in late March and with Lisa's help I will purchase more periodically, to a total of four lots.

# BRINGING A LIFE TIME OF LEARNING TO SERVICE BEFORE SELF

Dave Osborne and his wife, Susan, have had a home in South Woodham Ferrers for 40 years. Dave grew up in Chadwell Heath where his father was an officer in the Metropolitan Police. He had an active childhood in the Cubs and Scouts, encouraged by his father who was a leader in the Sea Scouts. He was a keen dinghy sailor and enjoyed the outdoors. Family holidays involved camping and Dave particularly recalls the adventure of a camping holiday in Europe where they went from country to country finally ending up in Austria. The achievement of a Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award and a visit to

Buckingham Palace to receive the Queen's Scout Award from her majesty were early clues that young Dave was someone with bright prospects.

Dave joined the Ford Motor Company from school as a Technician Apprentice. As the years went by he gained experience and qualifications that led to increasing levels of responsibility within the organisation. His work demanded extensive travel within Britain, Europe, North and South America and India. During his time with Ford he relocated his family twice to Cologne in Germany. When he returned to the UK he participated in a joint degree programme between Ford and the University of East London, graduating in 1993 with an honours degree in Engineering.

His rise in the company's management ranks continued, becoming Lead Engineer coordinating a new engine production facility in Russia. By 2014 he was in a management role with Ford Land Division based in Cologne, having responsibility for building and construction projects throughout the Ford estate. "In June 2019 with more than 40 years service I retired from all this world travelling having enjoyed every minute of it", he said.

Introduced to Rotary by Kush Dave he was attracted by the idea of service to the community. Like many people he had not been aware of how wide Rotary International's reach was until he did extensive research on line for his role as Club Compliance Officer, "I had never appreciated how large Rotary International was globally", he said. "I had no impression of how large and organised it was." He detected similarities between the management style of American-based RI with the culture of Ford. "Reading RI documents entirely reminded me of my career with Ford".

He sees that Rotary fellowship is important "but we need to combine fellowship activity with more community activity and more fund raising events". He recognises that service to the community and fund raising are the keys to the Club's success. It was very clear from the meticulous and professional way he approached the task of Compliance Officer that the occupational skills developed in his working years are a significant resource available to the benefit of the Club's progress.

The Object of Rotary "recognises the worthiness of all useful occupations and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society". Dave Osborne's skills and vocational background surely make him an ideal Rotarian in pursuit of those objects.
