Vice President Kush says......





Rotary funds two Nebulisers for SWF

"These are much needed items" said David Peffer, Community Services Chairman.

The Club has funded the supply and maintenance of two mains operated nebulisers at Crouch Vale Medical Centre. The nebulisers were provided by Asthma Relief, a charity established in 1997 to give help to people suffering from respiratory problems such as asthma, emphysema and chronic pulmonary obstruction. Asthma Relief is currently donating (free of charge) more than 1,500 nebulisers every year to people of all ages throughout the UK.

A nebuliser helps those suffering from breathing difficulties. It may, for example, enable a child with severe breathing difficulties to go on a family or school outing or an older person to get out of the house and engage more. Due to the cost, nebulisers are not always freely available to people with breathing related illnesses. There is an insufficient number of machines in our area and the Club is very pleased to fund two more, using money donated by the generosity of the people of SWF and environs.

"We may well wish to donate more should the need arise".

"At the moment we are on the verge of some serious expansion of involvement with our




local Schools which we hope will lead to such opening Interact and Rotaract Clubs but achieving stability in what we are doing now takes much longer than one might wish."

ROTARY'S MR SOUTH WOODHAM

It would be no exaggeration to call Steve Evans "Mr South Woodham". He has lived in the town for most of his life and has owned the former petrol station in Old Wickford Road for forty years. Steve went to Elmwood Primary School and from there to Moulsham High in Chelmsford. His childhood memories are of roaming free in the countryside and lanes beside the river before the modern town was built. "We used to swim in the river and play in the mud", he recalled. He also remembers he and his friends collecting empty drink bottles to to claim refunds at 3d a time from the local shop.

Steve came to South Woodham at 4 years of age when his father built two houses that can still be seen in Albert Road. As a teenager he had little time for school. "The only things I liked were Metal Work and Maths and I skipped school a lot." On leaving school he started in Fords Tractor Plant with the prospect of an apprenticeship. "But I really wanted to be a chippie and follow in my dad's footsteps in the building trade".

It was for this reason that he jumped at an invitation from an uncle to go with him to work on the construction of a power station in Germany. "I learnt enough German to be able to give instructions to the crane driver and other members of the team as their foreman". Steve has good memories of his time in Germany as a young man earning more than ten times the wage he earned in England. Eventually he had to return home for family reasons and take over the garage from his father. "I originally planned to build houses on the site but once I started working there I found I enjoyed it so much that I kept it on".

Steve has moved five times in South Woodham as well as living in Latchington and once owning a farm in North Fambridge. The enterprising nature that earned childhood pocket money collecting refundable bottles stayed with help when it came to buying property. "I always bought houses when prices were going up quickly", he said. Quick thinking enabled him to buy the farm when a West Ham footballer offered to buy his house if he would complete within two weeks.

Growing up in South Woodham and owning the garage has made Steve well known in the Town where, as he puts it, "Everybody knows everybody". Steve says, "I'm proud to be a Rotarian because I want to give something back. Membership and the friendship in our club has given me confidence and the sense of wanting to help anybody in trouble."

Steve says that he is at a stage in life where he and Sandra are still fit and able to do things and go to places that they never had time for while working. They have a bucket list of countries they want to experience. "This means that I can't do everything I would want to because there will be times when I will have so much else going on. But there will come a time when I can do a lot more".

Nevertheless there is no doubting Steve's commitment. He has established himself as a valuable contributor to the Club's fellowship and one who is always ready to step forward when there is a job to be done.
